A most sincere and heartfelt thank you to the more than fifteen thousand people who have nominated me to serve our county as Justice of the Peace. I am honored by your confidence in me to represent our community and impartially administer justice in our courts. I graciously accept your nomination.

These are trying times for the American experiment in self-governance. Countless crises fester in communities across the county. Over-incarceration, systematic injustice, and corrupt politicians have plagued our system for far too long. Yet, I am more inspired than ever by this democratically conferred nomination to continue our campaign for honesty, equality, and fairness in our local government.

The campaign began over eight months ago when several volunteers and I went door-to-door to meet with neighbors and listen to the issues that matter most to them. By mid-March, more than 1,200 voters had signed our candidate nomination petition. Our support has grown substantially since then.

It has been a privilege to meet with so many kind and caring people in our community. And I have delighted in the opportunity to speak with voters about how we can better deliver justice to everyone.
